Extra: Urban sprawl; houses need to be built, so they are built on the edges of cities, so areas of rainforest have to be cut down. [2]

3 Outline **one** positive economic impact of deforestation.

It is a source of money for the central government. places/governments can invest in infrastructure, such as schools & hospitals.

When trees are cut down, CO₂ is released into the atmosphere. The CO₂ traps the sun's heat causing global warming. (1)

4 Outline **two** environmental impacts of deforestation.

Impact 1: Trees absorb CO₂ and also release oxygen, however, when a tree is cut down, it releases the stored CO₂ into the atmosphere. this leads to global warming.

Impact 2: Soil erosion - as there are no longer trees to protect the soil from wind and rain, it loses the last of its nutrients, then over time dries up and cracks, so its no longer fertile, so the process of desertification takes place.

1. 1 assess the extent to which deforestation

Model answer:

You should see modelled examples

Firstly, 16a has a higher peak discharge and a shorter lag time because it would likely be in an urban area with lots of impermeable concrete, leading to increased surface run off. Whereas 16b will more likely be surrounded by permeable surfaces such as grass, soil and soft rock allowing most water to infiltrate.

Secondly, there is likely to be more trees in 16b to intercept the rainfall and elongate the lag time, however, in 16a, there will be less vegetation so
