Degree Apprenticeships.



To find out which level might suit your child best, have a **look at current apprenticeship vacancies** and their entry requirements.



#### **Higher Apprenticeships**

• **Levels:** 4 and 5.

 Equivalent to: the first year of a Bachelors degree, Higher National Certificate (HNC), Higher National Diploma (HND), or foundation degree.

• **Duration:** Two to five years.

• Typical salary: £20,000 to £24,000 per year.

• Popularity: growing

#### **Degree Apprenticeships**

 Levels: 6 (Bachelors Degree) and 7 (Masters Degree)

Students can apply for apprenticeships while still at school but can only start an apprenticeship once they are no longer in full-time education or work.



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## What are the Pros and Cons of an Apprenticeship?



#### **PROS**

- Cost instead of having to pay off student loans and other university debt, apprentices earn a wage straight away.
- Work experience while university students will need to organise their own placements and internships, apprentices get to learn on the job and are given responsibility from the outset.
- Networking opportunities apprentices work with industry experts and pick up valuable contacts that should prove useful throughout their career.

#### **Things to Consider**

- Work/life balance apprentices work at least 30 hours per week, so may need to study in the evenings and at weekends, which could affect their social life.
- University experience as part-time students, apprentices are not fully immersed in university life, so it might be more difficult to make friends and join societies.
- Commitment higher and degree
   apprentices could be tied to the company for
   at least three or four years, so it's important to
   for apprentices to be sure about what they
   want.

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#### Where can you find a Higher Apprenticeship?

Major recruiters in all sectors offer Higher Apprenticeships, including:

- Aon insurance apprenticeships with the opportunity to achieve a professional qualification from the Chartered Insurance Institute.
- **BAE Systems** Level 4 and 5 apprenticeships in areas including: business, commercial, engineering, finance, HR, IT and supply chain.
- <u>Babcock</u> data analytics, electrical design, engineering, finance, and procurement and supply chain.
- <u>Barclays</u> range of programmes lasting 3 to 5 years in areas like corporate and global banking, cyber security, finance and HR.
- **BBC** data analyst, journalist, junior production coordinator and post-production technical operator.
- **BP** digital product management, software and platform engineering, and supply, trading and shipping.
- <u>Civil Service</u> apprenticeships in various government departments in areas like finance, digital and counter fraud.
- <u>National Health Service (NHS)</u> variety of roles such as associate ambulance practitioner, HR consultant, nursing associate and healthcare science associate.
- Rolls-Royce Nuclear engineering technician or procurement roles.
- WTW data engineer and software developer programmes.

#### When and how to apply

Some employers take on apprentices throughout the year, but others keep to a recruitment cycle. For companies advertising September start dates, the application process usually takes place from October until February or March.

As with most jobs, you apply for your apprenticeship directly to the employer. In the first instance, you typically complete an <u>online job</u> <u>application</u> or submit a <u>CV and cover letter</u>. This is followed by an <u>interview</u>, although you may also be asked to attend an <u>assessment</u> centre.
